## Bilingual Books Added to the Collection

Great River Regional Library (GRRL) would like to thank the St. Cloud Reading Room Society for adding new Somali/English bilingual titles to the library system's World Language Collection.

The St. Cloud Reading Room Society's mission is "to promote reading, literacy, culture, and education in our community" (stcloudreadingroom.org). Libbie Brunsvold and Jannine Provinzino are co-chairs of the No Worry Books Committee within the society, which carries out projects to benefit the community in promoting literacy. They shared, "We saw the need [for bilingual books] after Hudda Ibrahim spoke to the Reading Room about Somali literacy, and after contacting schools and several community groups regarding their needs. The committee chose the main St. Cloud Library as the most central and accessible location for these books. The library indicated a need to supplement their bilingual collection, and we were able to donate fifty-three bilingual English/Somali books." The books are now on the library shelves and available in the online catalog across the region.

## Remembering the Carnival – **Breanne's Summer Reading Reflection**

The Summer Reading Challenge was always a big deal to me growing up. Now, as the Communications & Development Coordinator at GRRL, I can walk down memory lane with historical pictures on file.

Before the St. Cloud Public Library was in its current location at 1300 West St. Germain Street, it was downtown at 405 St. Germain Street. Each summer, I recall the highly anticipated carnival that wrapped up the Summer Reading Challenge at the St. Cloud branch. I would ask my mom to take my friends and me to the library to excitingly play all the carnival games together and pick out our reading prizes. I enjoyed reading already, but filling out the reading logs, attending the carnival, and picking out prizes were great incentives. I remember the event being so grand: so many people, games, prizes, and excitement. It was a highlight of my summer!

All kids who returned their first Summer Reading Challenge reading slip received an invitation to the carnival, which included a certain amount of carnival tickets. Kids could then use those tickets to play the games and get coins to turn in for prizes. More tickets were for purchase, with all proceeds going to the children's room. Kids were guaranteed at least one coin for every game they played, which added up to at least one mini-prize.

I wondered, "Did it seem so extravagant because I was a child?" After talking to library staff who worked at the event, I realized it was indeed a large undertaking! Patron Services Coordinator Chris Mallo, who was the Children's Librarian during my childhood years, tells me that the carnival had over 70 volunteers in its last years! Volunteers staffed the games, prize table, and popcorn stand. You received tickets for several games, such as beanbag toss, leapfrog, the fishpond, and putt-putt. Plus, there were activities throughout the library and outside the building, including balloon animals, face painting, and a temporary tattoo station. Of course, a huge prize table was where summer readers and carnival game winners could

exchange their coins for prizes.

Although the Summer Reading Challenge may look different now, we still see kids flooding the library in the summer. We now have more participants than ever before, all eager to read, attend fun events, and turn in their reading slips (with anticipation of the end-of-summer prizes). All who sign up receive a book bag upon registration, thanks to our generous sponsors, and are invited to attend the library's free events throughout the summer. Kids continue to make summer memories at their local library!






# Support the Library by Sponsoring
